Are you using Booking.com and Airbnb?

Escalate our BDS campaign to pressure both companies to end their complicity by **signing the pledge as an ethical traveler.**

“Until they end their complicity in Israel’s apartheid and war crimes, I pledge to not make my travel reservations through these aggregators as much as possible, and instead use alternatives or reserve directly with the properties.”



Digital travel companies and aggregators, especially Booking.com and Airbnb, are complicit in Israel's apartheid and ethnic cleansing of Indigenous Palestinian communities. They list illegal settlement properties built on stolen Palestinian land, a war crime under international law, as Israeli rentals on their sites. Neither company has instated due diligence processes to ensure their platforms don't provide services and safe haven to war criminals and genocidaires.

Palestinian civil society and global solidarity campaigns have called for pressure on the two companies to end their complicity. Workers within Booking.com have echoed these demands. **Despite being listed in the UN database of businesses involved in illegal Israeli settlements as well as flagged by the office of UN human rights expert Francesca Albanese, they have paid no heed.**
